The Chairman & CEO's Message



Welcome

Enhancing patient care at the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital is the driving force behind everything we do. This annual report presents the key financial information for 2013. It sets out how the Mater Foundation funds were spent to progress patient care. This includes the purchase of state-of-the art equipment, enhancing facilities and developing special programmes to help the Hospital deliver first class medical care.

Over €2.4 million was allocated to wards and clinics in the hospital. Thanks to our volunteers, supporters and partners, we achieved our goals despite huge challenges in the economy and the bad publicity surrounding some organisations in the charity sector.

Our total income for 2013 was just over €3.5 million, which we raised from fundraising, trusts & foundations and donations. This is a decrease of 12% over 2012 but was a major achievement at a time when the community and voluntary sector overall experienced decreases of between 11-25%.

Highlights of the year include:

- Elan's €300,000 donation to the Neurological Appeal at the Mater Foundation, part of a €1.5 million commitment over five years.
- Grants awarded to The Maurice Neligan Heart & Vascular Hybrid Theatre, €650,092; the Family Heart Screening Clinic, €292,779 and BreastHealth Mater, €218,992; among others.
- Enabling donations of €940,991 from patients and families direct to accounts for specific wards and clinics in the hospital.

The Mater Foundation is making a direct and positive impact on patients' lives, some of which are highlighted on pages 4 & 5.

We wish to thank the staff in the hospital, our supporters and volunteers. The Mater Foundation's success and achievements are due to your dedication and tremendous contribution.

We look forward to continuing this great work towards improving all aspects of care for patients of the Mater Hospital in 2014.

How lives are changed

Coaguchek restored normality in my life!

"Coaguchek is a small device with a big impact. Let me explain my route to taking daily Warfarin. Due to cancer I had a very successful bone marrow transplant in 2001, followed by years of chemotherapy and now regularly attend for immunoglobulin treatment. Through the years I remained a firm believer in being independent, walking with cancer rather than negatively battling it, and embracing everything life has to offer.

Then, in April 2013, I suffered a stroke. I found the experience very different and personally more challenging. Lifelong Warfarin with its inevitable regular monitoring entered the arena. I felt a small erosion of my independence and a chipping away at my confidence. Weekly visits to the clinic became part of my life and I began, for the first time, to feel like a 'patient'.

When Dr Fionnuala Ní Ainle mentioned Coaguchek, I jumped at the opportunity. It is simple to use – a quick check and then a reassuring phone call to the Mater Warfarin Clinic for my dosage and advice. No more traffic jams or parking difficulties. A few weeks into using it, I am extolling its virtues to everyone! Psychologically, I am back in the driving seat and the best testament to the value of this device is that I am writing these few words from holidays in France. Having freedom to travel, to be myself – what more could I ask? It is simply great!"

Our goal now is to replicate this model in all ward areas, so that every patient and family can have a place of sanctuary to meet and discuss their concerns in privacy and dignity with hospital staff."

Offering hope to cancer patients


"In 2013, the Mater Foundation part-funded a HIPEC perfusion system for the Mater Hospital. This machine allows us to treat patients with a specific type of cancer that is extremely difficult to treat effectively. The Mater is the first hospital in Ireland to offer it. This new aggressive treatment can significantly increase survival, improve quality of life, and potentially offer a cure. It involves surgery combined with a special type of chemotherapy known as HIPEC. Since its arrival, we have treated a number of patients with significant success and it is wonderful to offer hope to our patients. Our 4 Pillars of Work

Thanks to the support for the Mater Foundation in 2013, through fundraising, trust & foundations and donations, life-changing health care has been made possible. Here are some examples of how funds have been used to advance care, treatment, diagnosis and research at the Mater Hospital.

Care

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In 2013 the Mater Foundation funded a small number of **nursing positions** throughout the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital.

Nurses funded by the Mater Foundation worked in a number of departments including Palliative Care, Breast Cancer Care and the Family Heart Screening Clinic.

Nurses are the backbone of acute hospitals. They are a huge contributing factor in making the Mater Hospital a Centre of Excellence. The nurses funded by the Mater Foundation offer exceptional care and support to patients and their families; often at extremely difficult times. Nurses often

go beyond the call of duty to ensure that a patient is as comfortable and peaceful as possible.

We are delighted to support these vital roles that are outside the remit of the HSE and would otherwise not be possible.

Treatment



A new **Solar Simulator for Dermatology** means patients no longer have to travel to the UK as was previously done. Solar Simulator testing has been available in the Mater Hospital for 20 years.

The Mater Dermatology Department provides a national service for photosensitivity testing, treating children

and adults from all over Ireland. This is the only definitive test diagnosing photosensitivity and is essential in providing high quality care for patients suffering from debilitating photosensitive disorders such as Lupus, Dermatitis, Psoriasis and Eczema.

Diagnosis



In 2013 we part funded a state of the art **3 Tesla MRI Scanner**. This scanner was badly needed, particularly for breast cancer and neurology patients. Providing this new scanner has also reduced waiting times for patients in urgent need of diagnosis.

In women with a high inherited risk of breast cancer, research shows that an MRI scan is more sensitive than a mammogram for finding breast tumours. The image quality with the 3 Tesla MRI scanner is superb and it is technically one of the best quality scanners in Ireland. It gives clearer images of the tumours, thus allowing more accurate and effective treatments.

Research



The Family Heart Screening Clinic is funded entirely by donations to the Heart Appeal at the Mater Foundation. On average, 50 young people under 35 years of age die suddenly and unexpectedly due to cardiac disease or SADS each year in Ireland.

The Family Heart Screening Clinic at Heart House is **a hub for research and advocacy** on unexpected and/or unexplained sudden cardiac deaths, as well as research and advocacy on inherited cardiac diseases.

In 2013, Dr Catherine McGorrian published research findings from her work which found that in keeping with international estimates, 30% of families of SADS victims were found to have a potentially inherited cardiac disease. This research highlights the Clinic's **lifesaving work** funded by the Mater Foundation.

Expert Care for the Future

Dear Supporters,

The Mater Foundation has helped the Mater Hospital push boundaries and improve standards of health care excellence in the last decade. As we look forward, we are committed to making even greater leaps in research, diagnosis, treatment and care.



We hope to raise our target total of €1.5 million through our Cancer Appeal to equip St Vincent's Day Ward, our new Cancer Day Ward at the Mater Hospital, which will comfortably accommodate over 8,600 patients who come through to receive treatment each year. It's an exciting project and will be an excellent addition to our cancer services.



We look forward to launching the Spinal Injuries Unit Appeal, a new appeal, to raise

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funds for vital equipment. Also early in 2014 we plan to open the Maurice Neligan Heart & Vascular Hybrid Theatre. It will be the first of its kind in the country. The theatre will transform the way we care for Ireland's cardiac patients. Cardiac radiologists, vascular surgeons and cardiac surgeons will now be able to give a patient the care they need in one theatre. For patients, it means fewer anaesthetics, fewer operations and less time in hospital.

We hope to launch the Men's Cancer Alliance (MCA) with two other charities The Mercy Hospital Foundation in Cork and Cancer Care West in Galway. The MCA will aim to create awareness about men's cancer, treatments and supports available and also to raise funds for men's cancer support initiatives. Additional plans include a new Legacy Campaign in mid-2014.

Thank you for continuing to support this valuable and important work for the future. As always through our fundraising, we strive to raise as much unrestricted income as possible for the hospital on top of giving vital support via our existing appeals.

What makes our care unique

The Mater Hospital is the only hospital in the Republic of Ireland that performs heart and lung transplantation. This successful appeal, launched in 2012, brings together the National Centre for Cardiothoracic Surgery with Heart and Lung Transplantation. Our stronger fundraising focus enables us to benefit all the wards involved.

The Appeal has enabled us to provide vital equipment, support essential training and education and enhance patient care and support. In 2014 we hope to continue raising funds for this appeal so it can help more people like Sarah who you read about earlier.

Our focus in 2014 is towards the purchase of new equipment for delivering ground-breaking breast reconstruction surgery for women suffering from breast cancer. When in place, the surgery possible with this equipment will give Mater patients the best possible treatment available internationally and we will be the only hospital in Ireland to offer it.

The equipment will be used for taking fat from the abdomen or thighs and injecting it into the breast in the area of the

deformity caused by surgery. The results from fat transfer are fantastic for patients after cancer treatment.

The Family Heart Screening Clinic at the Mater's Heart House has been providing comprehensive cardiac evaluation in a family based manner since its opening in 2007. We hope that going forward the Mater will perform genetic counselling and obtain consent and samples through the Mater Phlebotomy Department directly.

Our plan is to propose that a scientist spends a period of 3 months working at a chosen gene sequencing laboratory abroad to be trained and allow us to start performing gene sequencing in the Mater Pathology Department. This is a very exciting development for The Family Heart Screening Clinic.

Finally, we are really excited to move forward with the Blue September Ireland Campaign and have Vhi Healthcare sponsoring it for a second year. This means we can look forward to helping more men fight cancer.















A bit more about us

The Mater Foundation was set up in 1985. It is a registered charity and is a company limited by guarantee. We are autonomous and not a subsidiary of the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital.


The company has charitable status (Registered Charity No: CHY 9768) and all income is used for the promotion of our charitable objectives.



The **voluntary Board of Directors** (Council Members) meet a minimum of four times a year and have overall responsibility for the strategic development and policy of the company. The Directors, all of whom are non-executive, are drawn from **diverse backgrounds in business and the professions** and bring a broad range of experience and skills to the Council. The secretary also sits on the committee but has no voting rights.

The Chief Executive manages the operation of the company and is responsible for the day to day management of the office including the recruitment and supervision of staff.
