

When Carol was brought to the Mater's ICU, fighting to breathe, her doctor was getting ready to wheel out the ECMO machine, if she needed it.

Carol's lungs had been damaged from Covid. As she grasped for every breath, she worried not only for her own life, but for the life of her unborn baby.

What does a bigger ICU mean?

- Treatment for patients whose care has been deferred or affected over the last two years
- Doctors able to plan lifesaving surgeries knowing that ICU beds will be available for their patients to recover
- Immediate care for patients who arrive needing emergency treatment, such as car accident victims

"Because of you, my life and Alfie's are safe."


Alma Murray, whose eldest son Ben passed away suddenly after cardiac arrest in 2016.



Ben's first day in secondary school. "He loved the whole idea of secondary, different classes, and meeting people."

"There aren't enough words to thank you." – How you helped save Alma and son Alfie's lives.

- Ben passed away suddenly at the age of 13 from a rare and undiagnosed arrhythmic heart condition.
- Friends, team mates and family, joined to create a memorial jersey for Ben, and raise money for the Mater.
- Through the Family Heart Screening Clinic that you've supported, Ben's mum and little brother have been saved.



Ben loved playing rugby from a young age. After he died, his family learned he was being scouted for the Leinster squad.

At six feet, Ben was tall for his 13 years. He loved playing rugby, football and hurling.

Described by his mum, Alma, as a 'happy and healthy boy', Ben had only started secondary school the September before.

Growing up, there was never any sign that anything was wrong with Ben. He was strong and healthy, and rarely got sick.

But life for the family took a tragic turn on New Year's Eve in 2016.

44 After a takeaway dinner, Ben got up from the table and said he didn't feel well. I said the same. 'We're never

getting food from there again!' They were the last words I spoke to Ben. He went off into the playroom to play on his Xbox.

I brought his younger brother Alfie down to shower him. Then I went into the playroom to call Ben to take his shower.

I found Ben unresponsive, sitting on the couch.

Alma rang the ambulance. Ben's dad performed CPR. But it was too late. Ben had passed away by the time he arrived in hospital.

The family were referred to the Mater's Family Heart Screening Clinic, where doctors performed ECHO, ECG, and stress tests. They also arranged for samples of Ben's heart to be sent for genetic analysis.

66 My husband's and Alfie's tests came back normal.

But the stress test showed I had irregularities in my heartbeat.
Dr. McGorrian pinpointed CPVT, a rare type of heart arrhythmia that may be the cause. She was concerned and put me on medication straightaway.
She had that insight.

Test results from Ben's heart samples revealed he had the gene specific to CPVT. Follow-up genetic testing showed both Alma and Alfie also had the gene.

Alma was devastated.

Losing Ben to it, knowing that now Alfie has it, and the fear of losing him... it was like another kick in the stomach.

But thanks to kind people like you, who've helped fund vital equipment for the Family Heart Screening Clinic, Alma and Alfie are on heart medication.

And a year ago, Alfie got fitted with a device that monitors his heart rate, and sends the information to his medical team in his local children's hospital.

Alma is grateful for the Family Heart Screening Clinic, and for amazing supporters like you.

Lifesaving equipment we need YOUR HELP to fund for patients and staff at the Mater

As you can probably guess, lifesaving hospital machines come with a big price tag.

Any size gift you can send today will go toward purchasing these vital pieces of equipment the Mater needs to save lives.



CRRT Machines (5 needed)

€20,602 each Total Cost: €103,012

Continuous Renal Replacement Therapy (CRRT) provides 24/7 treatment to critically ill patients suffering acute kidney injury.

This machine cleans the blood in the kidneys and removes toxins. Without it, patients are at higher risk of kidney failure, and death.



Patient 'Essentials' Pack (300 needed)

€50 each Total Cost: €15,000 per year These packs contain clothing, sanitary and other essential items that the Social Work Department provides for patients who either can't afford them or who are unable to access their belongings.



Liver Ultrasound Machine for Theatre (1 needed)

Cost:€43,400

Currently the Mater has only one of these machines in its theatres. A second machine would allow twice as many liver surgeries to be carried out, reducing waiting times for patients.



Therapy Chairs for Dialysis Patients (3 needed)

€4,797 each Total cost: €14,391

These specially designed chairs provide maximum comfort and help reduce pain and fatigue for patients undergoing dialysis treatment.
