Welcome from Chair and CEO



Delivering excellence in care to patients while investing in and shaping the medicine of tomorrow.

The Mater Misericordiae University Hospital (MMUH) is home to more than 4,200 staff, caring for more than 400,000 patients each year. As a leading level four acute hospital and also a teaching hospital it comes as no surprise that it is one of the busiest hospitals in the country.

Every year, demand for services grows, placing increasing pressure on the hospital's facilities, resources and staff, which is why the Mater Foundation exists.

As the official fundraising body for the hospital, we provide the crucial additional funding over and above core State funding to make the ordinary, extraordinary. We enable the hospital to respond to urgent and increasing needs, to continue to develop world-class patient care, and to always put the patient first.

In 2021 we continued to feel the full force of Covid-19 which presented on-going challenges across the hospital campus. Our already over-stretched nurses and doctors continued to respond at rapid speed to deal with the ever-evolving situation.

Despite the extraordinary disruption caused by this once-in-a-century global pandemic, the hospital continued to remain ambitious in its focus. It further enhanced its role as an international leader in the provision of complex care and specialist services, and as a result, so did the Mater Foundation.

2021 marked the launch and successful completion of the first year of our new Strategic Plan, *A Strong Foundation Builds a Better Future, 2021–2025*.

We have ambitious plans to double our fundraising income from a current average of €4million to approximately €8million a year by 2025, resulting in a target of €30million raised across the course of the plan. This year we set a solid foundation to achieve this. In 2021, we set out to achieve an ambitious target of \in 4.8million. Even with the continuation of Covid-19 lockdowns and unparalleled uncertainty, we surpassed this target by 16%, raising a total of \in 5.6million.

Thanks to this uplift, the Foundation was able to invest more than €2.4million in state-of-the-art equipment and essential projects that will help future-proof the hospital and save more lives.

When it comes to critically ill patients, every second counts, so we were delighted to directly fund €1.1million in upgrading essential patient facilities and advancing life-saving medical equipment. Thanks to the unwavering compassion of our supporters, the Foundation contributed towards the refurbishment of the hospital's National Breast Health Unit, allowing this busy national service to diagnose and care for breast cancer patients. We equipped the Special Care Unit with ICU-standard patient monitors to help care for acutely ill patients.

Always putting patients first, making the ordinary, extraordinary

Investment was made in equipment such as two portable ECHO machines for patients requiring diagnosis and monitoring of heart conditions.

Thousands of patients will receive timely diagnoses and care as a result of these investments for the future.

Additionally, this year we have been able to designate and commit a total of €3.5million for multiple projects across the hospital. This included €1.06million towards the purchase of a new digital PET/CT scanner, the only one of its kind in the country; €500,000 to equip the new Rock Wing with ICU beds; and €102,000 to improve hospital facilities for patients undergoing haemodialysis, creating a nicer, less stressful hospital experience.

We provided €541,000 to support hospital staff to be their best through education and training initiatives, including support for educational conferences, enabling staff to continue their professional development within their own

specialities and disciplines. A further €412,000 was granted to fund specialist staff in the areas of Oncology, Cardiology and Care for the Elderly, helping to deliver the very best in care for patients.

Recognising that today's research could be tomorrow's treatment and cures, the Mater Foundation was able to grant €263,000 towards research projects. Support was dedicated to ground-breaking research in triple negative breast cancer, colorectal cancer, genetic diabetes, spinal fusion failure and inherited cardiac conditions. This funding supports the hospital to further embrace translational research, linking scientific discovery to best clinical practice and outcomes enabling the hospital to provide cures and better care to patients and their families for generations.

Our ability to continue to invest in the future of the hospital is only possible due to the generosity and committed support of several key groups. Our sincere thanks goes

to the passionate and dedicated Mater Foundation team, who work tirelessly to deliver professional and positive results daily. Our voluntary Board of Directors, who, utilising their broad range of experience and skills strategically guide and steer us. Thanks also goes to the inspiring medical teams and staff within MMUH, who dedicate themselves selflessly to every patient that steps inside the hospital.

And of course, our incredible fundraisers and supporters, who through their time, loyalty and generosity, fund 100% of the Mater Foundation's work.

Collectively, we have weathered one of the most difficult periods in recent history, but despite this, in 2021 set solid foundations to continue growing our investment in the future of MMUH, dedicating vital funds where they are most needed and can have greatest impact on patients' lives.

Our Impact

Advancing medical equipment A new PET/CT scanner for MMUH

This year, thanks to the generosity of our supporters, the Mater Foundation was able to provide €1.06million in funding towards the purchase of a new digital PET/CT scanner; the best of its kind in the country.

The digital PET/CT scanner is a critical piece of equipment for detecting and managing cancer. It is also used to diagnose illnesses such as Parkinson's Disease and Dementia.

A PET/CT scanner has been in use at the Mater for many years providing advanced scans. However, the machine had turned obsolete and needed to be upgraded.

Now, thanks to the kindness and unwavering dedication of Mater Foundation supporters, we have been able to bring the very latest in medical technology to the hospital. The new PET/CT, which scans patients at a much faster rate, means that over 1,000 patients each year will have access to a state-of-theart PET/CT service. This will lead to more patients being diagnosed earlier, receiving more sophisticated treatments that can be provided with detailed monitoring, and creates opportunity for new treatment pathways to be developed giving patients access to therapeutic trials.

This is a long-term investment that will make significant improvements to the lives of patients and reaffirms MMUH's position as a leading national unit for PET/CT.

One such patient, who was one of the very first people to avail from the new digital PET/CT scanner was **Hermann Mitchell**.

Hermann needed many PET/CT scans over the last three and half years. Although the older model machine did a good job, it was very noisy, could be uncomfortable and meant that Hermann was exposed to higher doses of radiation.

The introduction of the new digital scanner made an enormous difference to Hermann: "Being in the new scanner was like stepping out of a 40-year-old car and into a brand new Rolls Royce!"

The new scanner is faster, more accurate and allows imaging at a significantly lower dose to patients and staff.

The new PET/CT scanner at MMUH represents the most advanced technology of its type in the country, future-proofing a highquality service and much better patient experience for many years to come.

Research and Innovation – developing the medical breakthroughs of the future

Funding a specialist genetic diabetes nurse, Marie Burke

Maria Byrne, a Consultant Endocrinologist leads the Mater's Diabetes Clinics. She has established a national clinic for the personalised treatment of patients with genetic forms of diabetes, known as Mature-Onset of Diabetes in the Young (MODY). Through a grant from the Mater Foundation we have been able to provide funding towards a specialist genetic diabetes study.

This is the only clinic of its kind in Ireland, and until now, there has been no research or treatment facility of this type across the country.

We are all used to hearing about the increasing rates of Type 2 diabetes. The diabetic clinic at MMUH currently looks after more than 8,500 type 2 patients. Type 1 diabetes occurs when the body produces little or no insulin by itself. Genetic diabetes is less well known, formed by a collection of inherited disorders that remains largely mis-diagnosed. In real terms, this means that there are hundreds of patients being treated as Type 2 diabetics, when in fact, they have a MODY gene. These types of genetic diabetes account for 2–5% of all cases.

The impact of a patient finding out that they have MODY, rather than type 1 or type 2 diabetes can be life-changing. Through Dr Byrne's study, and the work of specialist nurse Marie Burke, some patients have been able to stop using insulin, and in some cases Dr Byrne has been able to stop patients' medication completely. The discovery of MODY has a huge impact on a patient's outcomes and quality of life.

The study also works to identify women with genetic forms of diabetes prior to pregnancy. This early identification is of utmost importance as such diabetes genes can strongly affect the baby's birth weight and cause challenges to the baby's glucose levels at birth.

This is a ground-breaking study being led by the hospital, impacting patients throughout the country as the study is able to accept referrals from diabetes units across Ireland.

It is anticipated that approximately 425 patients with a genetic cause of diabetes could initially be uncovered. If their family members are also screened, the study could support in the region of 850 patients, whose lives can be improved through better diagnostics and a personalised approach to treatment providing better results and less risk of the serious consequences of diabetes such as damage to the heart, blood vessels, eyes, kidneys and nerves.

Fred Toher has been living with what he, and doctors, believed to be type 1 diabetes for over 60 years.

It was only when one of his daughters had the genetic diabetes testing done while living in Edinburgh, that the family realised that there was a third, genetic form of diabetes. Fred, who has been under the care of the Diabetes Clinic at MMUH for many years, told Dr Byrne about his daughter's results and he was tested as part of her pioneering study in Ireland.

The results were dramatic. From taking insulin for over 60 years, and suffering from many complications as a result of his condition, Fred's treatment was changed to a simple tablet that is more effective for his type of genetic diabetes. Plus, his three daughters, who also have the genetic form of diabetes, have all been identified through the study and are able to effectively manage their condition through tablets, rather than insulin injections.

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Our Impact

Future-proofing education and training by investing in staff

Funding a Laparoscopic Simulation Hub to provide patients with less invasive treatments

It is often difficult for junior doctors to gain access to 'live' training opportunities, especially in surgical skills. Currently, access to theatre training is at an-all time low for multiple reasons: an increasing demand on services; growing complexity of surgeries; and the compounded effects of Covid-19. As a result, many doctors are concerned about the impact on future patient services and levels of care.

Dr Claire Thompson, Consultant Gynaecological Oncologist at MMUH recognised this problem for her Obstetrics and Gynaecology team and set about creating a solution: the Laparoscopic Simulation Hub.

Laparoscopy or minimal access surgery has become a particular focus of concern. Benefits for patients are well recognised, but it is a surgical field which requires time and dedication to skills training, having an initial steep learning curve. Simulation training is fast becoming integral to the skills and knowledge development of surgeons.



As a leading level four teaching hospital, teaching and training are an integral part of the work of the hospital, providing the highest standards of training to the next generation to ensure optimal patient care.

To this end, the Mater Foundation was delighted to part-fund the establishment of a Laparoscopic Simulation Hub with virtual reality simulators to support trainees to develop and test their skills to create an advanced standard of patient care and safety.

> It is vital that we continue to invest in our trainees. The long-term impacts are profound: For a trainee doctor, if they can master basic skills using simulators, this will in turn reduce the "nerve-wracking experience" of operating for the first time on a patient and aid more timely progression of skills.

The development of the Simulation Hub establishes MMUH as the regional flagship in progressing surgical training and is a vital step in prioritising the continuance and development of healthcare in Ireland.

Our Impact

New services and patient support Always putting patients first

Exercise during cancer treatment has numerous benefits. It helps maintain and improve strength and cardiovascular fitness, both of which are very important in withstanding and tolerating cancer treatments, including surgery.

For people with breast cancer, group exercise brings the enormous benefit of peer support, allowing patients to meet others who are either on the same journey or who are returning for rehabilitation after successful surgery. The combined effect greatly reduces fear of surgery and enhances psychological wellness. Exercise also gives the patients a degree of control over their health at a time when many important decisions in their lives are being made by others.

In addition, for some people there is an important self-identity element that is built around exercise participation, particularly for those who were active before receiving a cancer diagnosis.

For all these reasons, the Mater Foundation was delighted to become one of the partners funding the cancer exercise programme provided by ExWell Medical, supporting breast cancer patients to make guided exercise part of their cancer management.









One such lady, who has participated in the Mater Exwell Exercise for Cancer Programme is **Fidelma Greene**.

Fidelma was diagnosed in December 2020 with triple negative breast cancer following a routine mammogram. She was treated at MMUH, where she had surgery a week before Christmas, followed by four rounds of chemotherapy in early 2021.

Fidelma was supported by the hospital's breast care staff throughout the whole experience, helping her deal with the shock of the diagnosis and to understand what was happening at each stage of the process. Taking part in the cancer exercise programme provided by ExWell Medical, Fidelma has found that the exercise programme has been fantastic for helping her to get back into a fitness routine following her surgery and chemotherapy because the exercise is embedded into her treatment plan.

This investment marks the holistic and innovative approach that the Mater Foundation takes when it comes to supporting patients and their direct needs.

Principles of Fundraising

We are honoured to maintain the Charities Institute Ireland Triple Lock certification. This recognises that we are compliant with the Institute's standards for transparent reporting, governance, and good fundraising.

Transparent Reporting:

The Foundation prepares a Trustee's Annual Report and Financial Statements in full compliance with the Charity SORP (Standard of Reporting Practice under FRS102) and makes them easily available to the public on our website.

Governance:

A crucial part of our strategic plan is to strengthen our organisation and governance plays a key role in this.

We believe that good governance involves putting systems and processes in place to ensure that the Foundation achieves its charitable objectives with integrity and is managed in an effective, efficient, accountable, and transparent way.

We are fully compliant with the Charity Regulator's Governance Code, and this is updated annually and reviewed by our Board. Our codes and policies guide our organisation, ensuring that we always stay true to our values and ultimately be the best organisation that we can be.

Good Fundraising:

The Foundation implemented all the requirements for the Statement of Guiding Principles of Fundraising in 2011 and continually reviews its performance against these principles.





Structure and Management

As the official fundraising body for MMUH, the Mater Foundation was incorporated and registered as a charity in August 1985. The Mater Foundation is totally autonomous and is not a subsidiary of the hospital. The Foundation is governed by its constitution.

The Mater Foundation is governed by a Board of Directors (council members) who serve in a voluntary capacity. The Board consists of no less than seven directors and no more than eleven. The Directors, all of whom are non-executive, are drawn from diverse backgrounds and bring a broad range of experience and skill to the Board. The Board of Management of MMUH are invited to nominate two people to be Directors of the Foundation. The Company Secretary also sits on the Board but has no voting rights. We extend our gratitude and thanks to each of our Board Directors who give their time and expertise without remuneration. Special thanks goes to Mr Feargal Brennan and Professor Padraic MacMathuna, who both resigned from the Board this year after serving their term. We also welcome Dr Brian Marsh and Mr Paul Keane and thank them for joining us to support the navigation of the Foundation over the coming years.

There were no expenses claimed by any of the Directors over the course of the year.
