

The Mater Hospital is a national centre for a wide range of specialities and super specialities. It is a main centre for cancer care and one of two Major Trauma Centres in Ireland.







Chief Executive and Chair Welcome



On behalf of our dedicated Board and passionate team, we are delighted to present the Mater Hospital Foundation's 2022 Impact Report. In the pages that follow, you will gain an insight into the profound impact our supporters have had on the lives of patients in the Mater Misericordiae University Hospital in 2022 through their generous support.

The past twelve months have been a uniquely uncertain and challenging time for everyone in this country. As a nation, we continue to collectively walk a difficult road, as we work to come to terms with the trauma of the global pandemic and the changes and loss that it has brought. It has also been a difficult journey for the hard-working teams in the Mater Hospital, as they move out of a period of intense emergency, and face into new challenges and new ways of working in a post-COVID world.

The Mater Hospital Foundation has weathered the economic impact of the pandemic, thanks entirely to the phenomenal kindness of our supporters, old and new. This commitment to supporting healthcare ensured that we could be there for our patients and the wider hospital community in the darkest of days when funding and investment was urgently needed.

But 2022 brought with it new challenges, as rising inflation took hold and we were hit by the economic effects of the devastating war in Ukraine. There is not a household in the country who hasn't been affected by the cost-of-living increases and the pressures that they bring.

But despite these serious obstacles, we were heartened and uplifted by the dedication that our remarkable supporters continued to show to our hospital and our shared vision of life-changing healthcare. As a result, we were able to raise a remarkable €3.7m to support our vital work.

We are immensely grateful and indebted to each and every person who has helped make this possible, whatever the capacity. Having a community of care that shares our vision and mission allows us to strive to be better and deliver more impact right across the Mater Hospital campus; our sole priority and the singular reason we exist. Our community of supporters truly are the backbone of everything the Mater Hospital Foundation stands for.

As we moved through the second year of our five-year strategy, 'A strong Foundation builds a better future', we remained focused on our key strategic priorities to ensure we are equipped to grow our income, strengthen our organisation, enhance awareness of our work and grow our supporter base.



We must continue to ensure we are aligned with the Mater Hospital's growth needs and are ready to invest in our four key pillars; advancing medical equipment; new services and hospital redevelopment; research & innovation and patient, family and staff support.

We are incredibly proud to share that we were able to invest more than €3.3m in essential life-changing hospital projects in in 2022; the largest amount ever in a single year. Being able to transform and enhance patient care through the generosity of our supporters is a joy and a privilege that we never take for granted.

Almost €2.1m of these funds supported advancements in medical equipment across the hospital. Some of our key projects in this area include two new portable cardiac ECHO machines and a life-saving ECMO machine for ICU, which provides advanced life-support for critically ill patients. We were also able to fund a new liver ultrasound, hydrojet liver scanner and infusomat medication pumps.

€124k was put to work to support new services and hospital redevelopments, including supporting the redevelopment of the Mater's Breast Health unit and the complete refurbishment of a haemodialysis bathroom.

Patient, family and staff supports saw an investment of €830k, which included the support of important oncology conferences and Cardiac Advanced Life Support Resuscitation education (CALS) training for staff. Once again in 2022, we were able to fund a wide range of care packs for patients, from 'Tree of Life' bags that support the work of the end-of-life care team, to comfort care boxes and homeless packs.

We also looked to the future of healthcare, by granting funding of €290k to support ground-breaking research in triple negative breast cancer, genetic diabetes and inherited cardiac conditions. In addition, we funded a research lab aide for the next-generation sequencing lab.

State-of-the-art equipment saves lives, and in 2022 we were able to designate a further €1.9m over our four funding pillars, some of which will be used to advance medical equipment, ensuring better outcomes for all patients across the Mater Hospital campus. We provided funds for five continuous renal replacement therapy machines, vasopressor equipment for the spinal injuries department, a mobile x-ray unit for the emergency ward, a mammography unit for the radiology department, and new ventilators for our new Rock Wing.

This is the real impact of funds raised and a collective achievement we share with our supporters, corporate partners, ambassadors and network of volunteers. Together, more lives will be saved, and better, stronger futures created for patients in the Mater Hospital, today, tomorrow and in the brighter days ahead. We are forever grateful for the on-going trust and support they show us year on year.

A special note of thanks also to the Mater Hospital Foundation team, whose hard work continues to nurture and strengthen our community of care. We would like to acknowledge the input of our voluntary Board of Directors, whose expertise and guidance has helped steer and guide the strategic development of the Foundation. Finally, our thanks to the Mater Hospital staff and teams, who inspire us every day, and who show unwavering dedication, compassion and professionalism in their work.





Cardiac Echo

Caring for our patients' hearts



Working with the Mater Cardiology team, we identified an urgent need for two portable Cardiac ECHO machines, used to screen patients with potential heart conditions.

Thanks to our supporters in 2022, we were able to meet this need and provide funding to equip the hospital with new state-of-the-art cardiac screening technology.

These new portable machines, which are the first of their kind in the Mater, support frontline staff in providing the best possible care for patients and are having a transformative effect on cardiac care.

This new equipment enables staff to provide more efficient and effective care to patients and the portable nature of the devices allows the cardiac team to scan at the bedside.

With these two new Cardiac ECHOs in situ, the hospital now has the capacity to test an additional 3,000 patients each year. This will help to address both immediate backlogs and build long-term capacity into the system.


Eugene Cummins is just one Mater cardiac patient who knows first-hand how important it is to have access to state-of-the-art diagnostic equipment like the new Cardiac ECHO machines. Eugene is ex-Defences Forces and has always been in good physical shape. Married with two adult kids and a young grandson, he started to feel unwell, and his cardiac care journey in the Mater began. He shares his story:

"I always thought I was in good shape, but I started to struggle with my breathing and general fitness. When I discussed it during a clinic visit I was referred to cardiology.

"A CT Scan of the aorta and an Echocardiogram followed, and a diagnosis was confirmed – I had an ascending aortic aneurysm and a bicuspid aortic valve. It was a shock. Under the care of the excellent Professor Lars Nölke, the size of the aneurysm was monitored. When it started to become enlarged, an intervention was needed.

"Very soon after that, I got a call with a date for the surgery. If I'm honest I was quite apprehensive, but everything happened so fast that I didn't dwell on it much. It was a complex surgery and I needed to spend two weeks in ICU (Intensive Care Unit) post op. On day seven I had two cardiac arrests, which resulted in a permanent pacemaker being fitted.

"It was a very worrying and stressful time for my family. Visiting restrictions were in place in the hospital ICU at the time due to Covid. However, Prof Nölke and the ICU staff were excellent at keeping loved ones

> informed of my progress and reassuring them that I was responding well. The ICU nurse manager even arranged a family visit the day after my cardiac arrests, which helped myself and my family enormously.

"Post-op recovery was initially very slow. I needed my pacemaker settings adjusted after three months. This helped things settle and I started to make a steady improvement. However, like many who undergo complex cardiac procedures, I struggled with my mental health after the surgery.

"It's common to relive the episode and find it difficult to sleep. That's where cardiac rehab plays such an important role. You can discuss these issues with the rehab team and patients who've been through similar experiences. There's also great advice and insight on diet, lifestyle and medication. These are really vital steps in helping you move forward.

"My family and I will be forever grateful for the excellent work of the Mater's cardiac team and the tremendous support given by staff."

ECMO

Advanced lifesupport system



In 2022, our supporters made it possible for us to purchase a new ECMO (extracorporeal membrane oxygenation) machine for the Mater Hospital's Intensive Care Unit. This machine provides an advanced form of life-support and is used when all other life-saving measures fail.

The ECMO machine takes over the function of the heart and lungs by oxygenating and pumping blood around the body and removing carbon dioxide. This is essential when a patient's heart or lungs have stopped functioning normally and it literally saves lives. It is no exaggeration to say that patients who require ECMO treatment are some of the most vulnerable in the hospital. Every year, extremely ill patients receive this treatment, giving them a chance to begin to heal and recover under the watchful eye of highly-trained ICU team members.

One patient who has experienced the live-saving impact of ECMO is Tina from Co. Limerick, who contracted double pneumonia in November 2022. She was struggling to battle the condition and needed the support of the ECMO team from the Mater Hospital to turn the corner. She explains:

"I was being treated locally in Limerick in November 2022, having contracted double pneumonia. It was an air borne bacterial pneumonia and initially I didn't feel too unwell. My family was advised that I was struggling and that my best possible chance of recovery was to connect to an ECMO machine, which was in the Mater Hospital in Dublin. The machine is used in critical care situations when your heart and lungs need help so that you can heal.



"There was no way I could be transferred as I was. So, the expert ECMO team from the Mater travelled down with the machine, connected me, and transported me to Dublin. During this stage of the process, my family were kept fully informed of everything that might happen.

"I ended up spending fourteen days under the care of the team at the Mater. Although I cannot remember any of it, listening now to my family and friends I know I was in the best possible hands. My husband rang every morning at 6am and was always reassured of my progress. Family and friends were all accommodated within hospital guidelines, all rostered by my amazing daughter, who at the beginning of my ECMO journey wasn't sure if I would come home.

"I do know that without the ECMO machine and the expert team at the Mater who operate it, I would not be writing this. I am still recuperating at home but am expected to make a full recovery. Hopefully when I am back to full health, I will be able to do a fundraiser of my own, so that I can help the Mater Hospital Foundation fund even more ECMO support at the hospital."

Hydrojet Liver Scanner

Precision liver surgery



When a patient has suffered liver damage or injury, treatment normally consists of liver repair or removing the damaged section of liver through resection or dissection. Traditionally this treatment is carried out using a heated method, which can cause damage to some of the healthy tissue close to the area being treated. The hospital's surgical team had carried out research in this area and identified that there were other treatment options that could provide better patient outcomes.

With your support, we were able to provide funding of €45k to equip the hospital with the EBREJET 2 system – a specialised water jet surgical device which allows for much greater precision and tissue-selectivity in liver surgery.

As a result, patients undergoing liver dissection or resection now receive an enhanced level of care and can experience quicker recovery times, while also reducing the risk of further complications. Improved patient recovery times can also help to free up bed spaces and allow for more surgeries to take place.



Breast Health Refurbishment

Excellence in breast cancer care



The Mater's Breast Health unit is one of eight National Cancer Centres in Ireland, and it receives approximately 8,000 referrals per year, with more than 400 cancers being diagnosed.

In 2022, we invested funds to support the refurbishment of this important unit, which is housed in a Georgian building on Eccles Street. After many years of use, the facilities were no longer fit-for-purpose with repairs needed to the wheelchair accessible lift, stairwell and office space for specialist breast health nurses and administration staff.

This investment of €66k from the Mater Hospital Foundation follows an investment of €120k in 2021 and has helped realise the goal of the unit to update facilities and provide a one-stop imaging and clinical breast care unit, that will enable patients to be cared for in enhanced, future-proofed surroundings.

There are a wide range of benefits resulting from the completion of this refurbishment work, including increased recovery space, a dedicated waiting room and additional clinic space for clinics. This important advancement is now helping women just like mother-of-four Kathleen, whose worst fears were confirmed in the Mater after discovering a lump in her breast.

"Hi, my name is Kathleen. I'm 47. I'm a mother of four. And a breast cancer survivor. "I found a lump on my breast after catching sight of it by chance in the mirror as I was getting out of the shower. It was rock-hard, like a marble, and I thought — that's not right. So I did what you'd probably do... ask Dr Google! And I know when you look up your symptoms on the internet, all roads lead to cancer. But this time, Dr Google was right. I went to the Mater in the Breast Health Unit, had my mammogram and biopsies, then I went into a consulting room, and the doctor told me I had an aggressive form of breast cancer.

"You hear the word cancer, and the first thing that comes into your head is — I'm going to die. That was my biggest fear. My Dad died young, and you think about your kids and who is going to look after them. But the doctors and nurses were so reassuring, and I started chemo almost straight away.

"It was tough for my little boy, Jake. He was only ten when I was going through treatment. I had to explain to him about my hair. That it would fall out. He'd say, 'Mammy, don't worry I'll still think you're beautiful.' You try to keep spirits up. I used to do silly things to make him laugh. Like, he'd be in his room, and I'd turn my head sideways — which was bald at this point — and peer around the door at him slowly, without a word. He'd catch sight of me and roll about laughing.

Dialysis Bathroom Refurbishment


Comfort and support for renal patients



Haemodialysis is a procedure whereby a machine is used to filter a patient's blood, when their own kidneys are not working properly. Patients who require this kind of treatment must attend the hospital on average three times per week. The Haemodialysis Unit on level two of the Misericordiae Wing provides treatment to more than eighty patients every week; patients who need regular, lengthy dialysis sessions to clean their blood and keep them healthy.

With the help of our supporters in 2022, we invested funds to completely refurbish the bathroom in this unit, which has had a profound impact on patients' experience.

Benefits have been wide-ranging, including improved infection prevention control due to the installation of an isolation cubicle for patients with Multi-Drug Resistant Organisms (MDROs). Safety in the bathroom has been increased with the installation of call bells in cubicles, which were previously absent. The refurbishment works also provide patients with greater comfort and privacy due to its enhanced layout.



Cardiac Advanced Life Support Resuscitation (CALS) Education

Gold standard care for cardiac patients

Cardiac Advanced Life Support Resuscitation (CALS) is a specialised form of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) that may need to be carried out on critically-ill or post-surgery cardiac patients. These patients are so vulnerable that standard CPR could be dangerous for them and cause them unintended harm.

Prior to receiving funding, hospital staff have had to travel off-site to receive CALS training and this became particularly difficult during COVID. No cardiac surgery hospital in Ireland was running CALS training on a regular basis. Now, thanks to your support, the hospital has been able to purchase a specialised CALS CPR mannequin to allow for training on-site, bring qualified external trainers to the hospital, in the short-term, to provide training and allow for ten members of hospital staff to complete a CALS 'Train the Trainer' course.

With ten hospital staff as trained instructors on-site, and the specialised CALS CPR mannequin for frequent practice, the hospital can now continually provide staff with the training and confidence to better treat critically-ill cardiac patients when they are at their most vulnerable.





Patient Comfort Care Packs

Caring for our most vulnerable patients



With your support, we are constantly striving to improve the experience patients who attend the Mater Hospital. As part of that drive to improve patient care, and thanks to your generosity, in 2022 we allocated funds of €10,810 to Patient Comfort Care Packs.

These packs are provided where they are needed most across the hospital and their aim is to deliver extra comfort to these most vulnerable of patients by providing small essential products that can make a big difference to their care.

They can arrive at the Mater Hospital from all across the country having undergone huge trauma, and are very unwell and extremely vulnerable. Typically, they may arrive without any belongings and their care needs mean they are unable to get out of bed to shower. They may have been unconscious for days or even weeks and have matted hair, dry or sore skin, chapped lips, etc. Packs for our homeless patients are specially-tailored to provide warm, comfortable clothing and essential supplies.

Providing care packs with hygiene products such as detangling hair shampoo, lip balm, toothpaste, hairbrushes, toothbrushes, razors, shaving foam, etc., can help ease patient discomfort and allow for an extra level of dignity and care.





Next Generation Sequencing

Research Lab Aide



The Next Generation Sequencing (NGS) Laboratory in the Mater Hospital's Department of Pathology uses genomics (the study of a person's genes) to inform therapies and drugs treatments for patients with blood cancers.

This lab is an important step in developing precision germline (hereditary) genomic testing here in Ireland and focuses on diagnostics and research. A key priority of the NGS Laboratory is to strengthen its people power in order to deliver on its strategic aims of providing diagnostic services, securing key accreditation and progressing research and development.

"The critical mass of expertise in Germ Line Next Generation Sequencing at the Mater NGS Lab has recently been recognised by the allocation of funding by the HSE to provide a national NGS service in cardiac genetics in particular Sudden Adult Death Syndrome. Our next priority is inherited blindness funding-permitting", says Prof Peter O'Gorman, Clinical Director of the Mater NGS Laboratory.


The Mater Hospital Foundation was proud to support this important project in 2022 by providing funding of €34,781 for a research lab aide to work on meeting these vital targets.

Having this resource is an essential element of 'ISO15189', the International Standard for Medical Laboratories - Requirements for Quality and Competence.

Benefits to our patients from the NGS diagnostics service include quicker timelines for sequencing results, additional expertise in the service and the expansion of the service to other clinical disciplines. Family members of patients will also benefit through the identification of inherited problems, which can lead to early treatment or clinical monitoring.

Patients will benefit from the research element of the lab's work through the delivery of precision therapeutics, through each patient's personalised genomic profile. It also will allow for the discovery of new disease targets for diagnostic testing and drug development strategies.







We believe that good governance involves putting systems and processes in place to ensure that the Foundation achieves its charitable objectives with integrity and is managed in an effective, efficient, accountable, and transparent way.

We are fully compliant with the Charity Regulator's Governance Code, and this is updated

annually and reviewed by our Board. Our codes and policies guide our organisation, ensuring that we always stay true to our values and ultimately be the best organisation that we can be.

Good Fundraising:

The Foundation implemented all the requirements for the Statement of Guiding Principles of Fundraising in 2011 and continually reviews its performance against these principles.

Structure and Management

As the official fundraising body for MMUH, the Mater Hospital Foundation was incorporated and registered as a charity in August 1985. The Mater Hospital Foundation is totally autonomous and is not a subsidiary of the hospital. The Foundation is governed by its constitution.

The Mater Hospital Foundation is governed by a Board of Directors (council members) who serve in a voluntary capacity. The Board consists of no less than seven directors and no more than eleven. The Directors, all of whom are non-executive, are drawn from diverse backgrounds and bring a broad range of experience and skill to the Board.



The Board of Management of MMUH are invited to nominate two people to be Directors of the Foundation. The Company Secretary also sits on the Board but has no voting rights. We extend our gratitude and thanks to each of our Board Directors who give their time and expertise without remuneration.
