t 38 years old, Caoimhe had just started a new job and was only five weeks away from marrying her fiancé, Eoin. Put simply... she was too busy to be sick.

So even as exhaustion and breathlessness crept in, she kept pushing through. "I was sleeping all day. I couldn't walk from the bed to the sofa without gasping," she remembers.

Eventually, she knew she couldn't ignore her symptoms any longer, so she visited her GP, who told her in no uncertain terms —

"Get yourself to A&E, now."

and often deadly condition caused by a build-up of protein in your organs — it can even stop your heart from working properly. Caoimhe is the youngest patient we've ever diagnosed with the condition at the Mater.

"I had no idea how sick I was," Caoimhe says. "I don't remember anything about that night... my family was told I might not survive."

Caoimhe was admitted right away, and our specialists began planning her urgent care, including immediate chemotherapy to slow the disease's progression and manage the damage already done to her organs.

The road ahead wasn't an easy one. But thanks to you, she was in the safest hands, and she could feel it...

## Sister Catherine's Vision, 'A Hospital for All...'

In the 1800's Ireland is gripped by poverty and disease. Witnessing the suffering of people, Sister Catherine McAuley begins work on her dream for a hospital for the people. 164 years later, her vision lives on in every life you help save...

t's 1820, and the death rate in Dublin is the highest in all Europe.

If you were poor and you or your child became sick, your chances of survival were thin — it was as simple and brutal as that.

It was this injustice that Sr. Catherine McAuley made it her mission to change. Her vision was to open a hospital within walking distance of Dublin's tenement slums — "somewhere the sick and poor could go without having to know someone or pay money."

Though she sadly didn't live long enough to see it open, the Mater threw open her doors in 1861 in accordance with Sr. Catherine's vision.
